From the Desk of Ms. Peterson, Superintendent

Iowa Department of Education Site Visit:

Our Department of Education Site Visit is scheduled for February 9-11. We have already found that our preparation for this visit is beneficial in helping us re-focus our attention on school improvement. I am sure that the Department of Education's Visit will result in additional assistance in helping MStM be the best school we can be. The Site Visit Schedule is located at the end of this newsletter.

Iowa Core Curriculum:

As I have written in previous newsletters, the Iowa Core Curriculum provides local school districts a guide for delivering instructional content that is challenging and meaningful to students. The curriculum identifies the essential skills and concepts for literacy, science, math and social studies, as well as 21st century learning skills (civic literacy, financial literacy, technology literacy, health literacy, and employability).

Our Iowa Core Curriculum Leadership Team consists of Josh Moser, Brenda Halverson, Melissa Schad, Sara Kuhns, Christy Holloway, Chuck Hilsabeck, Tom Wood, Mike Crozier and me. This team has been going to training for the past two years in regard to learning how to implement the Iowa Core into our MStM School System. Our teachers have also worked this past summer aligning our curriculum with the Essential Skills and Concepts of the Iowa Core. If you go to our school's website and click on the Curriculum Link on the left side of the Home Page, you will be able to see our updated curriculum. This is a work in progress. We do not have it fully completed. I hope to have our teachers continue working on each of their areas this coming summer.

Missed School Days Because of Weather:

As you know, we have now missed 7 days of school because of the inclement weather. The last day of school for students is scheduled to be June 4th. I plan to work with the School Board and our Staff to look at some other options to make up these days instead of just adding them to the end of our calendar. We will inform everyone about any changes we make as soon as possible.

From the Desk of Mr. Crozier

The month of February brings the ITBS/ITEDS to us. We will be taking these tests beginning February 1st and finishing on February 5th. All 7th through 11th graders will participate in these tests. We will be testing in the mornings, so it is important that your child be present and on time on these days. These tests are important to our school district. It is one measure of our success, according to the state and federal governments. We will be doing several activities in our Advisor/Advisee program to help prepare our students. Listed below are some things that you can do to help your children do their best on the ITBS/ITED tests.

Also, this year the seniors will be taking the Work Keys Employability test during the ITBS/ITED testing time. These tests will give them a gauge of their readiness to enter the work force. These tests will also give the district an evaluation of how we are preparing our students to enter the work force.

How to Prepare for Standardized Tests...

REST: Children should get a good night's sleep before taking the test! Keep their routine. By getting "plenty of sleep" actually means maintaining normal bedtime hours rather than going to bed much earlier than usual.

EAT: A good breakfast on the morning that your student takes the test is important. Test-taking activities require a lot of energy. The intent is not to have a big breakfast, if your student usually has a slice of toast and a glass of juice, but keeping a normal routine schedule is ideal.

Listen: Ask your child to listen carefully to the directions the teacher gives and to follow them exactly. If they do not understand what to do, they should ask to have the teacher repeat the directions or explain them again.

Dress: Have your child dress in layers—kids do better on tests if they don't have to think about how hot or cold they are.

Try: Do their best. They are not expected to know the answer to every question. Some of the questions may seem difficult, but they should keep trying and not give up. Don't be too anxious. Say, "This test is important. I know you will try hard and do your best." Your confidence will be contagious.

Maintain: Keep up regular study habits and not cram for this test. It covers more school work than can be learned in a few extra hours.

Relax: Students who are calm and sure of themselves do better.

Test Day: Give these tips: Skip a question and move on if you don't know the answer.

You can always come back to it later. Maybe you will be ready to answer that question then. Check your answers carefully. Make sure the number of your answer correspond to the numbers of the questions on the test.

Results from these tests will be made available sometime in the spring. If you have any questions regarding the test or test results, feel free to contact myself or Mr. Folkerts, the secondary counselor.

We keep a hard copy of all the scholarships for on the web site in the guidance office. Stop by and look through the scholarship book to see if there is anything of interest to you.

After School Shouldn't Be An Afterthought

After-school programs and activities can be wonderfully enriching, providing children with opportunities to stretch their minds, exercise their bodies, learn teamwork, and build social skills. Today's range of available activities is greater than ever—from computer classes to cheerleading clinics, music lessons to Scout troops, art and dance to football and soccer. Here are some important things to consider when enrolling your children in after-school programs:

Whose idea is it?

Try to make sure that your child has at least some interest in the club, sport, or lesson you're signing him or her up for.

What if you want them to attend and they don't want to?

Incentives can work wonders. Together, set two goals. The first is yours: spell out the activity you want them to participate in, the amount of time you want them to devote, and the attitude you want them to have about it. The second is theirs: by following your rules and achieving the goals you set for them, decide on the special privilege or reward they can earn.

How intense is it?

Some after-school gymnastics programs are a great excuse for children to burn off energy and learn a few new skills. Others are totally focused on training the next Olympian. Find the program that really fits what you and your child are looking for.

Can it help your child academically, athletically, or socially?

All children have areas of strength and areas where they need some enrichment or encouragement. After-school programs can help with both! Choose one activity that lets your child expand on his or her strengths, and try to find another one that offers a challenge. For example, enroll an athletic child in a basketball league and in the library reading club, or sign up a shy youngster in Scouts as well as an art or music class.

What kind of commitment are they looking for?

Your 10-year-old may have just what the coach or instructor has always dreamed of—amazing flexibility, artistic talent, a perfect butterfly, or a 90-m.p.h. serve. But be wary of programs that expect your child to commit to four days a week or more. Children still need time to do their schoolwork, sleep 10 hours a night, and to “chill.”

Have you heard good feedback from other parents and children?

The best after-school programs get great reviews from children and their parents. If just the parents are raving about a program, your children may be sorry you signed them up. If

just the children are crazy about it, it may be too lax or too expensive to meet your needs.

Are you over scheduling?

Unstructured playtime is very important for children. It's a great time for them to use their imaginations, "veg out," or just have fun. Be sure that you don't take their childhood away from them by filling every after-school hour with "enriching" activities. While there are many things to consider when contemplating after-school programs, remember also that anything you do is better than the all too- common alternative—letting your children decide, every day, what they want to do after school. Too many children today fritter away their childhoods watching television or playing computer/video games. Whatever after-school program you choose, help your children see that life is not a spectator sport.


