Iowa Department of Education Site Visit

Once every five years all school districts in our state receive a Site Visit from the Iowa Department of Education. Our Site Visit for the MStM Community School District is scheduled for February 9, 10, 11, 2010.

The Site Visit Process is set forth in the Code of Iowa-256.11(10) and the Iowa Administrative Code (Rules) 12.8(4)(A)(2). The purpose of this site visit is:

- To assess progress with the Comprehensive School Improvement Plan
- To make recommendations with regard to the visit findings for the purposes of improving educational practices
- To determine that a school or school district is in compliance with the accreditation standards
- To provide a general assessment of educational practice.

The team that will make this Site Visit will consist of Department of Education Staff Members, Area Education Agency Staff Members and Administrators from other School Districts. This team will spend the three days in February talking with Board Members,

Administrators, Teachers, Support Staff, Students and Parents.

Our school district will be providing information on our Comprehensive School Improvement Plan in regard to:

- The School's Vision, Mission and Goals
- Leadership
- Collaborative Relationships
- Learning Environment
- Curriculum and Instruction
- Professional Development
- Monitoring and Accountability

After the team is finished with this Site Visit, a Final Report will be issued to the School District. The findings in this report will be used to create a new five year Comprehensive School Improvement Plan for our MStM School. We will also post these findings on our website and in our newsletter for our community to view.

Quality Support Committee

We are in the process of organizing our Quality Support Committee for the 2009-2010 school year. Our first meeting for this committee is scheduled for November 16th at 7:00 p.m. We will hold these meetings in our high school library. This committee will meet three times throughout the school year.

Seventh grade Language Arts students have recently written a business letter in modified block style that incorporated the use of formal salutations, proper capitalization, paragraph structure, and weekly spelling words. The figurative language concept of simile was also included in the letters. The art of letter writing is not dead in this era of Skyping, blogging, and texting, and about half the students I surveyed say they still write letters to their parents while at summer camp and to aunts, uncles, and pen pals who live in other states. The letter writing assignment is part of preparing the students to demonstrate effective written communication in the global market upon graduation. Seventh graders have

also been introduced to the author Ernest Hemingway and how his life experiences are connected to his writings, like in *The Old Man and the Sea*.

In eighth grade reading, students are weeks into their unit called Change that encompasses the concepts of icons, iconoclasts, and revolutions. The novel *The Giver* by Lois Lowry is embedded in the self-paced unit, as the main character is an iconoclastic figure. Students are given the option of designing their own end product or choosing a product from a list that synthesizes their accumulated knowledge over the course of the eight-week unit. Students use laptops to complete their on-line assignments and research.

The yearbook staff spent two class periods selling business ads at the beginning of September. Their effort was exceptional. A special recognition goes out to senior Matt Holseid and junior Allen Brown for rounding up the highest and second highest dollar value in sales as of September 18. The theme of Too Good to Be Forgotten has been chosen for the 2010 yearbook, and the design team is now planning the cover and determining how the theme will be carried through the book. Students have been assigned job titles and pages to cover over the course of the school. Our student leaders and editors for first semester will be seniors Annika Harper, Haylee Gehringer, and Katie Simpson.

Mrs. Sowder's 7-12 Talented and Gifted News

Much has been going on behind the scenes in preparing for the year and meeting with the children of the talented and gifted program. There are a record 28 students enrolled, each with her or his own Personalized Education Plan being developed. Here is a little bit of what has begun or lies ahead.

The three new Friday seminar groups called Enrichment Clusters began on September 11. The groups are conducting scholarly studies of music legends (facilitated by me) broadcast journalism (facilitated by Mr. Moser), and criminology (facilitated by Mrs. Kandace Drees-Dunn). I received a \$200 Big Yellow School Bus grant this month, which will allow me to take all of the musically gifted students to see the Des Moines Playhouse production of *Annie* in December.

Thirteen high school students met for the first practice session of the Pride of Iowa Academic Bowl competition. There are only eight spots on the team, so for the first time, some students will be alternates or reserves. The practice sessions are monthly. The junior high TAG students will be competing on-line in the Knowledge Master Open in April 2010.

Other TAG contests have been selected for the 2009-2010 school year: History Day Contest, sponsored by the Iowa Historical Museum; Visions of Inventiveness, sponsored by the Belin Blank Center for gifted students or The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards, sponsored by the Alliance for Young Artists & Writers; and Josten's 2010 Photo Contest. Ms. Skellenger and I will be collaborating on the photo contest. She will be specializing in illusions and photo enhancement, and I will teach the seven rules of composition and emphasize the photographer as a storyteller. All of the contestants will begin their preparations in October.

Kate Cook, sophomore, and Alexandria Mallia, freshman, will soon be passing on their passion for Japanese art when they teach 3rd and 4th grade elementary TAG math students how to form origami shapes and animals and language arts students how to write haiku poetry and accompany the poetry with traditional ink blowing creations.

And finally, as a reminder to the public, as published in the 7-12 Student Handbook, parents and teachers may nominate a child for the talented and gifted program at any time during the school year. Students may self-nominate. Drop me an e-mail, send a note, or stop by my room to offer your nomination. See the Handbook for further details on this process.

The Iowa College Access Network Asks: What Comes After High School?

Now that you're in high school and have classes under control, have you started thinking about what comes after these four years? It's never too early, or too late, to start planning for your future. Do you want to go to college? Are you planning on joining the military, or will you start working right away? Is there a career you dream of pursuing, like being a doctor, teacher, journalist or graphic designer?

As the new school year gets under way, it's a perfect time to start preparing for life after high school. Thinking about the career you want can help you make other decisions, like if you should go to college, what classes you should take and maybe even where you should look for a part-time job during your high school years.

Think about what you like to do. Make a list of things you're good at, such as the classes you're doing the best in and extracurricular activities that you enjoy. Include activities and pursuits you're interested in, like hobbies. Don't forget about your values (for example, do you want to make a lot of money or is helping others more important?). Organizing your thoughts is a great first step toward thinking about what you want to do after high school.

Research using Choices®. Choices is the state's designated career-management system. It's an online program that helps you compare and choose from a network of education and career options. You can find a link to Choices at www.ICANSucceed.org.

Look into careers that interest you. Find out as much as you can about these careers by researching them online and talking to adults you know in these fields. Pay a visit to your school counselor and ask your family members and adult mentors for advice on your search, too.

Take the right classes. Make sure you're taking the classes needed for graduation, and, if you're planning to go to college, the ones you will need for college admission. Also take classes that appeal to you and apply to your career interests.

Consider hands-on experience. If it's possible, spend a day job shadowing, or check out volunteer opportunities that will give you experience in a field you're interested

in pursuing. The experience will look good on a resume or college admission application and you'll find out if that field is something you're good at and one you would enjoy.

Get a job that's a career stepping stone. Choosing the right summer job can give you a lot more than a paycheck. Ideally, you want a job that's in line with your long-term career goals. It might require some legwork to hunt down a summer job that's a perfect fit. For example, if you have set your sights on becoming a marine biologist, it may be hard to find a summer job in that field when you live in a land-locked state. Some ways you could gain related experience include working at a county conservation office or a fish hatchery.

Exposing Children to Career Choices

“What do you want to be when you grow up?” Upon hearing this question, chances are that your children have no firm ideas about what they want to be or do—but it’s never too early to help them explore all the options out there. Now, more than ever, children are seeing that there’s nothing that they can’t achieve.

Get them involved.

From Scouts to Boys and Girls Clubs, there are wonderful after-school organizations that help children learn and grow. Many bring in guest speakers to talk about their careers and take field trips to “work sites” ranging from fire stations to hospitals.

Read all about it.

School and public libraries are stocked with books for children that introduce them to interesting careers. Check out titles like *When I Grow Up*, *See What You Can Be*, *Jobs People Do*, *Career Day*, and don’t forget Dr. Seuss’ inspiring *Oh the Places You’ll Go*. Online, visit www.khake.com/page64.html, which offers career exploration guides and resources for younger students.

Have the “tools” on hand.

Children can’t know if they’re good at something unless they try it. By having a wide variety of supplies available, your children can explore different skills, while having fun in the process. Calculators, math puzzles and games, and building sets are appealing to those who might end up in math or engineering careers. Toy medical kits and a supply of Band-Aids are always a hit, and can light a fire in future health professionals’ lives. Art supplies, craft kits, and musical instruments may spur an interest in the arts. Check for low-cost used items at thrift stores or garage sales.

Help them start their own businesses.

While the days of newspaper routes and lemonade stands are fading fast, there are many ways kids can try out the world of work. With your supervision, your children could launch a pet-sitting or leaf-raking business, sell homemade crafts or baked goods, or earn cash working as “mother’s helpers.” Help them track how much they’re spending to advertise their services, show them how to set a financial goal, mark their progress toward it, and celebrate their successes.

Talk about your job.

Many parents have jobs that their kids can’t really comprehend. They might only know that you work in an

office building or a store. If you can, participate in Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day (held every April) so they can see what a work environment is like. Talk to them about the education and training you needed to get your job.

Keep them balanced.

It’s tempting for parents to see a talent in their child and focus just on that. But the most successful people in life have a wide variety of interests and abilities. Be proud and encouraging of your young artist’s work, for example, but make sure he or she also does well in math, science, reading, and other areas. Enjoy your youngster’s computer wizardry, but make sure he or she also learns about art and music, books and science, and the fun and team-building of sports and activities.

Be realistic.

Many children want to grow up to be professional athletes, rock stars, famous actors, or the president. While shooting for the stars is wonderful, and you should encourage all of their hard work to succeed, help them also realize that the competition for those superstar positions is fierce. Help them expand their dreams to include their ideal job as well as other related careers. If your child is aching to be a pro football player, for example, make sure he or she also knows about careers in physical therapy, sports medicine, physical education teaching, coaching, sports law, and other jobs related to sports.

AUGUST 10, 2009

The Board of Directors of the Martensdale-St. Marys Community School District met in regular session, pursuant to law, on August 10, 2009.

I. Welcome

VanHoose called the meeting to order at 5:35 p.m. and welcomed all guests.

II. Consent Items

Bunch motioned to approve the consent items seconded by Della Vedova. Roll call: 5 Ayes.

III. Celebrations

Mike Crozier congratulated the baseball season with a 25-1 record, 11-4 Conference record, 4th place. JV ended the season with a 23-2 record.

Softball season ended strong with a 35-8, 10-2 Conference record, tied for 1st place, Regional Champions, State Tournament Qualifier, and State Tournament 3rd place finish. JV ended the season with a 22-0 record. RAGBRAI went through St. Marys and Martensdale on July 22. Pictures were included in the most recent newsletter and Supt. Peterson congratulated the entire community for their hard work and support.

V. Old Business

A. Reports

1) Facilities Report – Supt. Peterson. Supt. Peterson introduced Matt Carlile to provide an update on the track and field project. Due to the continued rain the first two varsity games of the season will not be played on the new field. We are now shooting for September 25th as the first game on the field; which is Homecoming. On October 5, weather permitting; they will lay down the track. This will need a whole week to dry. The liquidated damages to MStM will be \$6000 per varsity game and \$500 per day after August 15. We are still pushing to move the start date up as work is being done late in the evenings and on weekends. The field looks great with the new drainage.

Mark Thiessen was introduced to give an update to the Board on the elementary gym entrance. It will be completed by next Monday. Sidewalks will be started this

week, handrails installed, and the roof will be completed. He then proceeded to update the Board on the air conditioning project. Twenty-three classrooms are now complete and we are now waiting on MidAmerican to install the meter. The high school gym has the air handlers in place, duct work in place, and the completion date is set for first week in September.

B. Presentations

1) Superintendent's Report – Supt. Peterson. Supt. Peterson reviewed the Professional Development Plan and the committee will be presenting the information to the staff during an August workshop. Supt. Peterson reviewed Professional Development Action Plan and the August Workshop Agenda. The New Teacher Reception is scheduled for Thursday, August 20th at 6:00. There will be a retirement celebration in honor of Jim Seymour's 34 years of service as a bus driver for our school district during the Open House that will be held on August 20th from 6:30-7:30 p.m. We will be having three new school board members this fall and we would like to have an orientation for them after our September 10th Agenda Meeting. Supt. Peterson concluded with the Common Core National Standards for Language Arts and Math.

2) Principal's Report –Tom Wood presented to the Board the new laptop policy and staff laptop computer policy. Laptops are in and are being prepared with encryption software (SafeHouse). Crozier reviewed the Career and Technical Report. He informed the Board that the admission prices have increased for the POI Conference from 4\$ for adults and \$2 for students to \$5 for adults and \$3 for students. He reviewed the APR Goals for 2009-10, the Drug Impairment Training and the Professional Development Class.

VI. New Business

A. Request to Speak

Doug George

Mr. George asked the Board to reconsider the bus driver position, due to irregularities in filling the bus driver contract. He had concerns on the process, Veteran Preference information, and a proposal that was altered. Drew Bracken of Ahlers & Cooney was in attendance and informed the Board that the administration contacted him before, during and after to confirm the process being used and that it was acceptable. A request of proposal was the process that was recommended and not an open bid process. He explained that the Veteran Preference was for an

employee and not a private contractor. The Board approved the most qualified and the lowest proposal.

B. Discuss/Approve Football Practice Location - Supt. Peterson

At the July Board Meeting, Ron Peterson recommended using the soccer field behind the school for varsity and JV practice and the JH would practice at St. Marys on the north end of the field and attempt to stay off the current baseball field. R. Peterson and Crozier presented to the Board an amendment to their recommendation in light of the construction meeting that was held on Friday, August 7, 2009. The fact that the new facility will not be completed until September 18th changes the scope of their recommendation. It was felt that the most viable option for our students is to use the St. Marys facility as we have for the past 30 years. It is predicted that we will miss 2 Varsity games, 2 Junior Varsity games and 1 Jr. High game. The expense and loss of income involved with moving these games to another location is costly to the activities program and the booster club. The athletes deserve to play their home games in our district since we have a field that is available to them.

R. Peterson informed the Board that after the soccer field had been reviewed it was determined that there was not adequate space for kick off, passes, and there were safety related issues. R. Peterson commended the baseball staff and volunteers for the tremendous job in making the baseball field a first class field, but unfortunately the facilities need to be used for football.

Bunch realized that the agenda item is talking about practice only but the Board needs to consider the St. Marys facilities for at least the first two home games and recommended the Facilities Committee meet as soon as possible. VanHoose felt that we do have the ability to control damages to the field and that we are not considering the seniors that will be playing baseball on the field for their senior year. DellaVedova appreciates the passion of the baseball community but the football team has played on the field for 30 years and recommended using some of the contingency money that we will be receiving from the new track/field project to fix the field in time for the baseball season.
